Wartime Sailor's Family Join Servicemen at **Dedication Service**

sailor who served in both world wars was honoured dedication service at Stephens Church attended by ratings from HMS Raleigh, the Royal Marines and the Mayor and Consort Hilary and Shojiro Frank. It was also attended by members of the family of Able Seamen George Stone, whose shattered gravestone had been discovered in the undergrowth by Peter Clements of Saltash Heritage as part of his research into the identities of all of Saltash's war dead of the two world wars, in commemoration of the centenary of World War 1.

Mr. Clements had contacted the War Graves Commission who confirmed that, with the church authority's permission, would thev erect a Commonwealth War Grave headstone to replace the broken

Research confirmed that George Stone had joined the Royal Navy in 1915 as a 15 year old boy sailor, training on HMS Impregnable moored off Devonport. He later married and settled in Long Park Road, Saltash where his wife and five children were living at the outbreak of World War II. George was then still serving as Able Seaman on board HMS Aircraft Carrier HMS Furious. Sadly he died of illness aged just 39 in December 1939.

Having thoroughly researched his service and family history and organised a service of dedication for the newly erected gravestone Saltash Heritage were now anxious to contact the family of George Stone but here they proved unsuccessful. Despite great efforts over several months they had no results until just five days before the date of the dedication service.

They then finally received as response from a Mrs. Nancy Chown of Exeter, daughter of George Stone, who confirmed that she, her older sister Mrs. Margaret Tucker and other family members overwhelmed by the amount of work that Saltash Heritage had put into finding the family and

organising the dedication service, and they could not believe that all of this was done for their father. The two daughters joined three generations of the family at the Stephens Church for midweek communion service and for the graveside dedication conducted by Revd. Catherine Sigrist that followed it.

The service attended by today's sailors from HMS Raleigh a boy representing Military Kids Club, included four buglers of the Devon and Somerset Fire brigade Ceremonial Unit with Drum Major Ian Washburn in attendance playing the last post, a parade of standards from local British Legion branches, and the reading of the Naval Prayer as the union flag was unveiled from the grave.

Mrs. Tucker, who was six at the time of her father's death, recalled his funeral as one of her earliest memories. It was just before Christmas 1939 and she believed she received just two presents that year, one from the Royal Navy and from her mother. The Royal Navy offered to place her and her four sisters in an orphanage but instead her mother struggled to keep them at home by means of working by day machining Royal Navy Uniforms and sewing their tapes at night with her children's' help. Mrs Tucker also had memories of attending St Stephens school and seeing soldiers from the adjacent camp march up the road, before the family moved to Plymouth and subsequently to Exeter where she and her sister Nancy still lives. They had

made one previous return visit to Saltash when her children were young and they had with difficulty discovered 'grandpa's grave.

'It has been a great honour to attend today', Mrs Tucker told us. 'The morning has been really lovely'. Saltash Heritage were also asked, "why all this for my dad" to which society secretary Liz Sharpe-Asprey replied, "As well as himself we feel that he represents all of those who served and died and who we are honouring today.'

Traders Seek Funding for Town Festivals

Three of Saltash's popular annual festivals and a new winter festival are to be taken over and run by a group of the town's leading traders, it is anticipated by some of these traders who are seeking town council funding towards this.

An application for £12,000 of 'Section 106' money was put forward 'to organise four annual events to increase footfall and the community spirit and offer more opportunity to local retailers.' They would begin with the Summer 'Love Saltash' Arts Festival this August, followed with the Christmas celebratory day in early December, and they plan to take over responsibility for May Fair in 2018. In addition they hope to organise an event in early 2018 around Valentine's Day when the town is traditionally quiet and local shopkeepers desire increased footfall.

Mike Woolford 'Treasure Island' told town councillors that if the monies requested for the first year were to be forthcoming he anticipated that events would make a profit, reserves would build, and so it would save the council money by no further subsidies being required in future years. He assured the council that he has a large number of volunteer supporters to make the scheme viable.

Town councillors appeared keen in principal to support the traders in their efforts but were concerned in particular about existing events, which already have established organising committees. The current May Fair committee in particular had written to the town council objecting to the traders ' proposals and

accusing them of an attempted 'coup'.

After lengthy discussion the town council voted 9 to 2, with two abstentions, to support the applicants in running the August event 'Love Saltash' for which there is no current organising They recommended group. that £3,000 of Section 106 money be allocated to this.

They also invited Mr. Woolford to return at the next council meeting to put forward more concrete proposals in respect of the Christmas event, which they would then consider. Mr. Woolford has already been appointed joint chairman. with Councillor Matt Coot, of the Christmas event's organising committee (FROST)

"The Saltash Events Team (SET) are happy with the outcome and are looking forward to serving the community of Saltash with forthcoming events starting in August this year" Mr Woolford told Observer, "Retailers will now be at the forefront of all

More recently he has embarked upon lengthy and painstaking research into the history of the town's war dead and seeking to resolve the anomalies relating to the two local war memorials. He was responsible for discovering the broken memorial to sailor

George Stone and for its replacement with commemoration service to mark this. A retired member of the Royal Navy himself he is also active in the annual poppy day appeal.

The third award is to a lesser known 'Local Hero' Jon Foster. Those who walked recently through the Coombe Valley woodlands should have noticed the results of his hard labours, which began with clearing the bramble, and other undergrowth, which had smothered the woodland for decades. Since then he has utilised his woodworking skills to created three benches and twenty bird boxes for the woodland as well as planted out hundreds of saplings and flower bulbs. 'Thanks to Jon Coombe Woods has become a beautiful and safe environment all done in his own time and at no cost to anybody', said the Mayor.

The Mayor had broken with the tradition of announcing the award winners prior to the May Fair, but it is at the fair that they will formally receive

their awards.

A Lively Debate for Flood Forum

The Saltash Community Flood Forum (SCFF) met with principal Officers of South West Water recently to question them on various water drainage issues in parts of Saltash including Forder and Broadmoor Farm.

Forum members attended the meeting, residents of Forder and other interested people within the locality, and chaired by Sue Hooper MBE.

The debate was very lively and interesting, and the SWW officers were challenged for vital information, which was done in a respectful way.

As a result, SWW pledged to visit Forder in the near future to survey areas of concern in the Village.

Another of the important issues raised by the Forum was the growing concern of human waste transfer and treatment from the proposed development Broadmoor Farm together with the inappropriate use of disposables (such as wet wipes and other matter).

SWW officers advised the meeting of its great concerns and overwhelming costs dealing with such issues, and provided the Forum with vital information in the way of a Poster and suggested that the Forum support the SWW efforts to promote proper use of disposing matter down their loos.

Saltash Community Flood Forum is an active platform for the Saltash Community with over 30 in its membership.

It concentrates on potential flooding issues, and raising awareness of such. The Forum has experienced membership within Scientific Environmental fields.

Dr Rebecca Pearce a valuable and active member of the SCFF stressed that there were other additional key

address Delving into the archives Philip Hunt opened by describing the early days of Saltash Old Cornwall Society from its inaugural meeting in March 1946 when it had been said ' it is felt that there is a strong Cornish tradition in the district'. Many names of those early members were still familiar, especially as some had been teachers at Saltash Grammar School. The first annual general meeting in 1947 looked back on a 'successful beginning' in which 120 members had enjoyed a boat trip on the Tamar and a lesser number a visit by train to Liskeard.
