Estate Youth Feel Estranged

The young people of Saltmill feel estranged from the general community of Saltash, believing Saltmill to be a secluded area in which they can just hang out and do just as they please.

This has been the finding of the Junkyard Youth Project who have focused on the area, working closely with Groundwork South West to make a presence in the area, giving the space a new updated look with repainting and signposting. When speaking to local young people and about other youth clubs and activities on offer within the town, the main response has proved that they do not want to be a part of any club and just want to hang out there in their own space. Junkyard will therefore continue to have a presence at Saltmill delivering youth work in that area.

This was a part of the report made by Junkyard to the annual town meeting. They also reported high attendance, sometimes of over forty at their bi-weekly evenings for open access to 11 to 19-year olds from 7 - 9 pm each Tuesday and Thursday. Professional youth workers join the Junkyard volunteers and together look at single issues such as bullying, drug misuse, social media dangers and exam pressures. The female only sessions on the last Monday of each month are becoming increasingly popular in encouraging young girls' confidence building and a funding bid will hopefully enable further outreach with these sessions in late 2020.

Bridge Barriers May Be Raised to **Protect Residents**

Turther plans to raise the safety barrier on the Tamar Bridge are under consideration following concerns expressed about the safety of those living below it in and around Lower Fore Street and on the Plymouth side. A report presented to the Bridge and Ferry Committee stated that there had been sixteen incidents of items thrown from the bridge or abuse addressed to residents, ten of these in Saltash.

Objects thrown included stones, road signs and traffic

cones, a fire extinguisher and even parts of a pig. While no injuries to those below had been reported there could well be casualties if this is enabled to continue. There is also the risk of jumpers crossing the barrier and landing in the road or on residents' property as has happened in the past.

Last year, as reported in your 'Observer', the Bridge and Ferry Committee fully considered raising the barrier on the south side of the bridge, at a cost of around £6 million .After considering the pros and cons it was decided not to do so as it was thought that potential jumpers could still surmount any barrier and it would be harder to encourage them back, also that jumpers might just divert to another place where they would be unobserved.

There is however, now some pressure to have a raised barrier limited to the bridge where it passes over land, but not over the river. Cornwall Councillor Derek Holley urged the Bridge and Ferry Committee to consider this, noting that it would not altogether stop items being hurled over but could save residents, children particular, from the 'life changing' experience of looking up and seeing hanging someone over. Between 2017 and 2019 there were 267 events reported as giving 'concern for welfare' and four deaths had resulted.

Bridge and Ferry Manager

David List, it was agreed, will contact management of similar bridges nationwide and worldwide to ascertain if any have partially raised their barriers and if so, what effect this has had. Once a report back has been received the issue will be considered further later in the year. Such work at both ends of the bridge is estimated to cost around £2 million as against £6 million for the entire bridge span, Cornwall Councillor Holley told the 'Observer', "The Tamar committee Bridge and officers have been doing research on this issue for over two years. We have had inhouse workshops and had a select committee call in and interview all manner of agencies involved in public safety on similar structures. We have interviewed the police, had advice from the fire service and from Public Plymouth Cornwall, as well as from public safety representatives employed by Cornwall and Plymouth councils.

We have gone into it thoroughly; it is time to make our minds up"

Councillor Holley added that he is pleased that there is, on the Tamar Bridge, an "absolutely superb network of support for those in distress, on site twenty-four hours a day". All staff are fully trained to help the desperate, even the bridge contractors on site are similarly trained.

Local Resilience Forum

ince the Civil Contingencies Act became law in 2004, all areas in the UK have a multiagency partnership to plan for emergencies and communicate during them. This partnership is called a Local Resilience Forum (LRF), and our local LRF covers Cornwall, Devon and the Isles of Scilly.

Our LRF is chaired by the police, and includes representatives from Cornwall Council, the NHS, and blue light emergency services. Since the start of the COVID-19 crisis, it has been meeting to review the guidance from central government and the situation on the ground. Information and communications from the LRF are being channelled through Cornwall Council, and collected on Cornwall Council's website: www.cornwall.gov.uk.

Cornwall Council has been working hard to make sure the information on its website is up to date and easy to access. A dedicated email address has also been set up for any questions you may have that haven't been answered by the website, or for any suggestions or concerns: covid19@cornwall.gov.uk.

Please use this covid19@cornwall.gov.uk email address to contact Cornwall Council - there is a team of staff dealing with the emails who have access to the latest information, so you will get up to date advice. But sending in an email also helps Cornwall Council gather information on current issues, and will therefore help to inform decisions that are taken by the LRF. Anyone who does not have online access can ring Cornwall Council on 0300 1234 100, but please be aware that many Cornwall Council staff have been moved to frontline roles and it may take a while for your call to be answered.

Tamar Bridge

Yornwall Council and Cornwall Council
Plymouth City Council jointly agreed to have temporarily suspend all tolls on the Tamar Bridge and Torpoint Ferry, in order to protect Bridge and Ferry staff and to facilitate the journey for key workers and for people travelling for essential reasons.

At the Bridge, Tag users may find that their tags beep as they are passing through, but their account will not be charged. Please pass through open booth lanes with care as there may occasionally be bridge staff crossing behind the toll booths.

The suspension of tolls will be reviewed as the situation develops and in the light of any further Government advice

Elderly & Vulnerable

ornwall Council is working in close collaboration with NHS Kernow and Volunteer Cornwall to ensure residents are getting the help they need during the COVID-19 pandemic. Various staff from Cornwall Council have been temporarily moved from their usual jobs to work with Volunteer Cornwall and increase their capacity. 

Tt's easy to work out what to write about this month, but harder to know what to say. These are times unlike anything we have known before, and it's difficult to be positive without being superficial or simplistic. There are though some things I think it's both difficult and important to remember right now, and some things we need to remember afterwards

For right now we need to be kind to each other and to ourselves. I've heard a few people arguing about 'who has it tougher' during lockdown and it makes me feel uncomfortable it's hard being stuck at home, it's hard having to go out. It's hard being on your own, and it's hard being cooped up with other people for a much longer period of time than you're used to. It's hard if you've never been confined to home before, and it's hard if you can't normally go out and suddenly everyone else is realising how difficult that is.

The fact that it's hard is also why we need to go easy on ourselves. Yes it would be great if everyone could use lockdown to learn a language, or write their book, or develop a new skill, but this is a time of great trauma and it's worrying and stressful. It's ok not to be at your most productive during a global pandemic, and it's ok to just focus on getting through each

As far as 'afterwards' goes: as I write we don't know when that will be or what it will look like. When it comes we'll naturally want to focus on the things we haven't been able to do - there are a lot of people I want to hug, places I want to go, experiences like eating out, going to the pub, and seeing live theatre that I want to pick up again. It's important though that we don't forget some of the important things we learnt during the crisis, and that we retain them afterwards. This

Recycling Banks to be Binned

The recycling banks in the Culver Road car park were to be removed by Cornwall Council as considered no longer necessary, the town council was told. But town councillors were angered at this claiming that they were still well used, often filled to capacity, and their removal could lead to more littering and reduced recycling.

The recycling banks were first introduced into Cornwall over twenty years ago, being placed on council owned and on private land to help boost recycling. However, in an aim to meet recycling targets all homes in Cornwall have had access to a kerbside recycling collection for over ten years. Cornwall Council claims that as increasing numbers of households have availed themselves of this, the recycling banks account for only 1% of the total recyclable waste collected in Cornwall and money could be saved by their removal.

This policy will not affect the facilities at the household waste and recycling centre such as Carkeel, nor will it affect the facilities provided by some supermarkets in their car parks.

As Cornwall enters into a new contract for waste and recycling disposal and public open space cleansing this October the contract will not include servicing of the recycling bins which will be removed in what is described as a 'phased and structured manner' with advance notice

Saltash town councillors in discussion claimed that there continued to be a need for the in Culver Road. bins Councillor David Yates stated that the bottle bank was often filled to capacity while Councillor Mike Parker who had a shop nearly stated the cardboard and bottle bin to be often overflowing. It was feared that their removal would lead to added fly tipping.

In reply Cornwall Councillor Derek Holley stated that while he personally did not agree with their removal they were sometimes found to contain as much general rubbish as recyclable items. Also, local businesses sometimes used them to dispose of the 'trade waste' for which they were required to pay for removal, thus avoiding paying revenue to Cornwall Council.

The Town Council could take over the bins but at a cost of around £6500 plus per annum decided instead to write a letter of objection to 'incomprehensible removal to Cornwall Council.

Tamar Bridges **Illumination Proposed**

Collowing the lighting up of prominent bridges across the Thames in London, now Network Rail are considering floodlighting the iconic Royal Albert Bridge. This was last done on a temporary basis for the bridge's centenary celebrations in 1959.

The proposal, which is still at a feasibility planning stage, was put to the Tamar Bridge and Torpoint Ferry Committee. It was suggested that they might wish to by similarly participate floodlighting the Tamar Road Bridge, which will be sixty years old next year.

Concerns were expressed bridge and ferry committee members over the cost of illuminating the road

bridge, which would have to be met from tolls and for which there is no current budget. There were also concerns as to light pollution, possible effect on marine life, and that the energy use is contrary to plans for Council, joint Cornwall owners of the bridge, to become carbon neutral by 2030 after declaring a climate emergency.

Network Rail confirmed that they were working with local authorities in Cornwall. Devon and Plymouth, regarding a proposal for permanent floodlighting of the railway bridge.

Town Asked for Input on Renewable Energy

altash, with all other Cornish towns and parishes, has been asked to share information and input as to local support for renewable energy, in relation to neighbourhood planning.

Cornwall council's project manager for climate change advised that the climate change team is currently seeking to identify locations suitable for wind turbines and other renewable energy sources. All such sites would have to undergo planning applications in the normal

A renewable energy study would then map the best areas for wind speed while also taking into account other factors including landscape sensitivity, proximity to residents and infrastructure, protected wildlife sites and world heritage sites. Local neighbourhood planning policies would also be taken into account before the broad areas for allocation of renewable energy sources are

Saltash town council has been asked whether they consider there should be any limit to the scale and size of wind turbines locally and if so why. They are also asked confirm any broad location which are or are not suitable and what policy can do to help ensure community support. This could include community ownership and benefit or community share. Saltash is also asked as to whether it considers the Climate Change planning should include a policy supporting community owned small-scale turbines in areas of greater landscape sensitivity, such as the Tamar Valley Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty that adjoins Saltash.

Remove Recyclables from Rubbish

ubbish taken to the tip bv residents Saltash and South East Cornwall may be inspected before it is accepted and deposited. This is a part of Cornwall Council's plan to boost its rate of recycling which currently stands well below the national average.

If a campaign to encourage residents to put out for recycling everything that is recyclable does not achieve desired results the alternative would be for black bags to be inspected. Household Waste Recycling Centre staff would then ensure that items which can be reused or recycled are removed before remainder is tipped into the waste for landfill sites.

Rugby Club Relegation as Early End to Season

altash Rugby Club has suffered as a result of the coronavirus, being relegated despite a winning streak during recent games indicating a likelihood of remaining in its present division had the final games been played out.

After recent triumphs in the last few seasons seeing the Ashes win their way to play on the sacred turf of Twickenham their fiftieth season saw them sadly slip from the Tribute Western Counties West to the Devon and Cornwall league.

This is considered unfair by players and supporters. When it became evident that the season would have to be abandoned, league officials decided to assess promotions and demotions based on points. It did not take into account the fact that Saltash, who had a tough start to the season following the loss of head coach Nick Skinnard, had recently recovered form and, with six games left to play, had two games in hand over the team below them, Cullompton, and the four teams immediately above

- a result of Saltash's pitch being unplayable earlier this year. While the football union decided to consider the 2019/20 season void for promotions and relegation (bad news for Plymouth Argyle who were on the edge of the automatic promotion spot) the Rugby Football Union took a different approach based on the team's positions after the last game that they played.

It is a sad ending to what should have celebratory Golden Anniversary season for Saltash Rugby Football Club. Club officials were considering the possibility of an appeal. Otherwise they will have to hope that the winning streak continues next season leading to a speedy promotion back to the Western Counties West.
