
everyone is looking forward to welcoming customers. And, of course, with every penny spent locally we are supporting the environment as well as the local economy.

Work Starts at Treledan...

Undeterred by Town Council Refusal

ork started on the Zero A phase of the major new development at Treledan (Broadmoor) in the middle of April, undeterred by Saltash Town Council's recommendation to refuse approval for Phase 1 of the development.

Residents of Carkeel Barns attended April's Town Council meeting to raise objections to Phase 1, which details the developer's proposals around the construction of an initial 387 dwellings, pedestrian walkways and cycle links. Residents spoke about urgent issues they are already facing with access to their homes, and raised concerns about Phase 1 proposals around topics such as green spaces and access to the A388.

Councillors recognised the need to build houses, but felt the plans were not aspirational enough. Reasons for the Town

Council's recommendation to refuse included concerns around the density of the proposed housing, and an insufficient use of Cornish stone. The Town Council called for greater consideration to be given to biodiversity in all areas of construction, and stressed the need for more trees and charging points for electric vehicles. It was particularly keen for the developers to take steps to

ensure that residents of Carkeel Barns are not inconvenienced during construction. These issues are now being discussed at Cornwall Council as part of the 'live' application for Phase

Permission for Phase Zero A was given in July last year, and April's construction work relates to the main east-west road, drainage and open space provision



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

Cornwall Council is putting arrangements in place to ensure polling stations are safe places to vote. Voters can expect many of the measures they've become used to over recent months. such as the use of hand sanitiser. floor markings and face coverings.

Details have been provided on the polling card that advise when visiting the polling station to wear a face covering, unless a valid exemption is in place. bring your own pen and follow the signs and guidance given at the station to ensure social distancing is adhered to. Uncontested Elections

here will be no elections in two of the three Saltash town council wards, or in Landrake with St Erney, Botus Fleming or Landulph parish councils, as not enough candidates put themselves forward election.

There are six town council seats in each of the Saltash Essa and Saltash Tamar wards, but at close of nomination there were just five candidates in each, so they have all been elected without the need for people to cast their votes. The town council election in the Saltash Trematon and Landrake ward is contested, with nine candidates contesting four seats. Elections for Cornwall Council are all contested, and will take place in all three divisions.

Polling day is Thursday 6 May, the same day that people will be able to vote for the Police and Commissioner. Due to the pandemic, votes for Cornwall Council will be counted on 7 May, while votes for town and parish councils will be counted on 8 May. There will be provisions in place at polling stations to ensure social distancing, and hand sanitiser will be available. People are being asked to wear a face mask when they cast their vote. and to take their own pen or nencil.

Chamber keeping us Updated

Car Parking in Saltash

Residents may have noticed that despite rumours on social media to the contrary the Cornwall Council car parks in Saltash are still free of charge. Cornwall has been offering free parking thoughout lockdown, and has stated that it will continue to do so linked to the stepped approach included in the Government's roadmap out of lockdown. Cornwall Council will give residents ample notice before recommencing charging.

The legal notices that recently appeared in Cornwall Council car parks also seem to have caused a certain amount of confusion. These relate to new rates that should have been introduced in April 2020 but were delayed by Covid, and

instead came into effect from 1st April this year. Cornwall Council is required by law to inform the public of the revised rates, as these will be the rates that will be applied once charging restarts.

Saltash Chamber had anticipated organising a subsidised car parking scheme once shops reopened after Christmas, and we are already liaising with Cornwall Council to see what is feasible to help our shops and retailers in this next period of opening up for 'business as usual'.

In the meantime, remember that cheap all-day parking at just £4.90 is available via the JustPark app when you buy in bulk - and you can also park by the hour and top-up additional hours without returning to your car.

Bridge Works

It was with a large amount of dismay that the Chamber learned about the recommencing of works to retarmac the surface of the Tamar Bridge – scheduled to start just as shops are set to reopen after lockdown. The tension on social media was high especially among independent Fore Street retailers.

One impact of the Bridge undergoing roadworks is the closure of the pedestrian cantilever, which has been a significant draw for people exercising, either on foot or on wheels and guides visitors into Saltash via Lower Fore Street.

Having the pedestrian cantilever closed during the spring and summer months will

be a blow for our shops just as they reopen. Danielle Frith from Truly Scrumptious based in lower Fore Street told Chamber: "The loss of trade to my shop each time the cantilever is closed is significant. This on the back of a lockdown and a year plus of the pandemic is going to impact the reopening of my shop just as we are hoping to get back to normal. It's poor timing for the town."

The Chamber of Commerce has written to the General Manager of the Bridge with a list of suggestions to ease the impact the roadworks will have on retail, but as this goes to press are still awaiting a response. We will keep you posted.

Town Community Stage Now Under Chamber Ownership

Ownership of the Saltash Town Council trailer, which many of you will recognise from town events, has been passed to the Saltash Chamber of Commerce. The trailer forms the stage at events like the Kalan Gwav Festival at Warfelton, and May Fair and Christmas Festival in Fore Street. The transfer of the trailer to the Chamber was agreed after a formal process, and it has been moved from Churchtown cemetery to a new home at China Fleet.

Saltash Town councillor Bill Philips said: "The trailer has become a regular part of town events and is useful to community groups like the Chamber who used to rent it from Saltash Town Council. The Town Council had stored it at Churchtown cemetery, but with the development of houses near the Churchtown site, it had become a bit of a blot on the landscape. For us, the best option was to offer it to a community group, and we're very pleased that the trailer has gone to a good home, and will still be an asset in the town."

Saltash Chamber intends for the trailer to remain a focal point of festivities, and will be offering it to groups organising local community events, ensuring an affordable stage is available to them.

Peter Ryland, Vice-Chair of Chamber added: "We would like to thank Dean Bennett, Managing Director at China Fleet for allowing the Chamber to store the trailer on their land. and Saltash Town Council for gifting it to us. Chamber will put it to good use as we start thinking about getting back to our role hosting those important events as we move through the easing of lockdown restrictions Chamber is very hopeful that It's new SaltFest 2021 event this July will go ahead as planned, and that the town community trailer will once again form centre stage."

The Death of HRH The Prince Philip Duke of Edinburgh



t is with great sadness that Saltash Town Council announce the passing of His Royal Highness The Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh who sadly passed away on Friday 9th April 2021 at Windsor Castle.

Following a successful naval career during which he saw active service in the second world war, the Duke of Edinburgh tirelessly focused his work in support of Her Majesty The Queen offering her support, stability and comfort as she led our country through times of enormous social change. His Royal Highness has been consort to Her Majesty The Queen Elizabeth II for over 60 years from Her Majesty's Accession in 1952 to 2021.

His Royal Highness also had many interests which he pursued separately to his work with Her Majesty The Queen, including conservation, engineering, and The Duke of Edinburgh's Award which he founded in 1956.

Over the course of his life, The Duke of Edinburgh was patron or president of some 992 organisations, with special interests in scientific and technological research and development, industry, the welfare of young people, conservation and the environment and the encouragement of sport.

The Duke of Edinburgh's Funeral took place on Saturday 17th April 2021 at 3pm in St George's Chapel, Windsor. The Funeral Service began with a National Minute's Silence at 3pm. The service was preceded by a ceremonial procession inside the grounds of Windsor Castle.

The nation joined in remembrance at the loss of His Royal Highness, The Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh who will be sadly missed.

Saltash Town Council convey their deepest sympathies and condolences to the Royal Family on their great loss.

Princely Visit to Parish Church Remembered

The passing of Prince Philip will bring back many memories of this stalwart supporter of the

In July 1962 Prince Philip accompanied the Queen to the parish church of Landulph where they were interested to examine the memorial to Theodore Paleologus, descendent of the rulers of the Byzantine Empire, The Roman empire of the East, who ruled from Constantinople. The royal couple noted the imperial arms displayed upon this tomb. They had been met by the Reverend Geoffrey Lummis and were presented to Churchwarden Messrs Hosking and Blatchford as well as Mr. Clark, the Tower Captain and the ringers who

MAJOR BOUNDARY CHANGES

The local elections on 6th May will see major changes in electoral boundaries for Cornwall Council in the

Previously, each Cornwall Council division has covered an average of 3,000 people. This will increase to about 5,000 from 6th May, and the number of divisions across Cornwall will be reduced from 123 to 87. Currently there are four divisions in central Saltash, but going forward there will be just two in central Saltash, one named 'Saltash Tamar', and the other named 'Saltash Essa'. A new division called 'Saltash, Trematon

and Landrake' will cover Latchbrook, Burraton Coombe, Forder, Trematon and Hatt as well as the parishes of Landrake, Botus Fleming and Landulph.

ment proposed for the countryside beyond Saltash has been recommended for rejection by Cornwall planners, who consider it inappropriate for the area.

Originally a holiday village was proposed to adjoin the St. Mellion International Resort with is renowned golfing This received disapproval and instead Crown Golf put forward plans for a retirement village to include 98 homes together with a nursing home accommodating up to 64 elderly residents. There would be a surgery and pharmacy, to benefit the over 65's to whom the houses would be sold. This is in addition to a holiday home reception with ten holiday lodges, a 'glamping' field and farm shop with microbrewery. Facilities would to open to local residents and Crown Golf claim that the scheme would offer employment opportunities and increased leisure facilities for local

officers Planning however condemned the proposedsubstantial development as too remote from centres of population and totally car dependent.

They were also concerned as to harm caused to the village environment including the historic village church and Horsepool Farm.

Cornwall housing department also expressed concern that the plans included a lack of provision for affordable housing alongside the luxury accommodation proposed.

Cornwall Council followed recommendations in rejecting the application citing in particular the fact that no approach had been made to local health services concerning the proposed surgery.

Ancient Pound Could be Historic Monument

The restored animal pound at Trematon. owned by Saltash Town Council, is not yet one of the 114 animal pounds and 376 village pounds listed as of local and historic interest.

Saltash Town Council is being asked to remedy this by applying to Historic England for listed status. A similar pound in Botus Fleming is already listed.

The structure is believed to be centuries old, possibly medieval but this uncertain. It was used to impound stray animals within the Manor of Trematon and later St. Stephens parish. The owners would have to pay for the animals to be released.

Saltash Old Cornwall Society took on a project to have the derelict and overgrown site restored, working with the Town Council, and it was officially re-opened in 2001 by the then Mayor Joe Ellison. He commented that it was probably the oldest structure Saltash council's ownership and he noted the restoration as being carried out using mortar and animal

dung in the traditional style. Former Town Councillor and keen local walker Peter Clements has asked the Town Council to seek listed status for the pound and it is anticipated that this will be considered by the new council after the May elections

Six Month Summer Resurfacing of Bridge Begins

altash commuters to Plymouth are likely to face yet further delays in their journey, following the announcement that the Tamar Bridge is to be resurfaced this Summer. This will be the first complete resurfacing since the original concrete deck was replaced with lighter steel and the two 'clip on' lanes were added during 2000 – 2001.

The work has to be carried out every two decades to safeguard the steel deck. The cost estimated at £6 million will be paid by the Tamar Bridge and Ferry Authority from money raised by tolls.

The work, delayed from last year by the pandemic, is due to start this month, April, and last until September. The

surface in the toll booth area will be replaced at the same time.

The pedestrian / cycle lane will be pressed into service as a vehicle lane to help minimise delays, with a bus service for pedestrians and cyclists as last Summer

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Tamar Reflections The Old Skeletal Hulks

n our regular walks around Forder, Antony Passage and Shillingham on the fringe of where we live, my husband John and I have always been inquisitive of the history of the old skeletal hulks that lay forlornly in the mud in and around Forder Lake.

We have passed one hulk almost every day and felt compelled to know more of this sad, forgotten, and decaying barge of times past and wondered what kind of life it had in its working life. We tried to imagine its former glory, and indeed, about the people that worked aboard her.

We know that sailing barges evolved from earlier open boats that reached their quintessential forms towards the end of the 19th century. From the ribs of the hulk, we could see that it must have featured a long boom and high peaked mainsail.

Typically, Tamar sailing were worked endlessly, bringing cargoes of limestone, dock-dung, and coal to Forder: Forder also being a thriving quarry area in the early 20th century. The barges would take away stone from the quarries, and transport grain and other produce from farms, market gardens and orchards.

Following the demise of horticulture and

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agriculture cargoes in the mid-1930s, the Lynher River roadstone trade employed locals until the early 1950s. The barges were practical and economical to use, however, by the 1940s, barges ceased to call into Forder.

The Crosslev family of Forder and Antony Passage were well known barge owners. There were three barges owned by Tor Quarry; "Pearl," "Maud Mary," and the "Lily," of which were manned by local men. Other local men closely associated with the barges and quarries were Jeffords (Tor Quarry), (bargeman) and 'Captain' Alf Taylor (Barge Skipper). These local men played very significant roles at Forder during these most industrious times, and descendants still live in Forder and Saltash today.

From our recent research, we believe that the remains of this sailing barge (pictured) on the west side of Forder lake, just North of the viaduct railway and Shillingham Quay, is the

Spawning Loss in Local Rivers Revealed

The salmon alarming conservationists are advising.

Salmon fishing was over the centuries and within memory an annual practice and form of income for Saltash fishermen. Now the Rivers Trust, a national organisation of various groups based in Callington, believes that human activity has caused the decline in fish returning to our local rivers and is anxious to reverse this before the fish are lost altogether. Over the past half large salmon century numbers have reduced by almost 90%, while the smaller salmon known as grilse are down by around two thirds.

Various concerned conservation groups are seeking evidence of the decline and reason for it in order to seek to regulate human activity that causes the decline before salmon are totally lost to the Tamar and other local rivers.

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n 26th March, volunteers from South East Cornwall joined activists nationwide in a day of action to throw a spotlight on the Climate and Ecological Emergency Bill (the CEE Bill), unfurling a bright pink banner at Saltash Waterside.

The CEE Bill calls for urgent the UK action from Government to tackle the and ecological emergency, and sets out a roadmap for the UK to play a full role in restoring nature and limiting emissions. It was tabled in Parliament last September as a Private Member's Bill - a law proposed by MPs who are not in government. The Bill was due to be debated again on 26th March, but this second reading was postponed by the Government, who cited backlog caused by the pandemic.

The CEE Bill was drafted by an alliance of scientists, lawyers and activists, and is rapidly gathering support from a broad range of campaign groups, businesses, charities and individuals. It is supported by over 100 MPs from eight political parties, including Labour, Liberal Democrats and Greens, but Cornwall's Conservative MPs have not yet publicly supported it.

Natalie Newton, one of the founding members of the SE Cornwall CEE Bill Alliance said: "We are seeing endless

The Bill is currently waiting for a new date to be set for the second reading, but it has a very low chance of progressing in this Parliament due to the volume of private members' bills lined up. Rebecca Coombes of South East Cornwall CEE Bill Alliance explained that with seven months to go before Glasgow hosts the UN climate conference COP26, the CEE Bill represents the government's last best opportunity of having a serious and comprehensive plan to tackle the climate emergency. Rebecca said, 'In South East Cornwall, as in the rest of the U.K. we are experiencing habitat loss and destruction from a number of sources, which puts the future of our world under threat. Our attempts to engage with Sheryll Murray MP have so far been disappointing, and most of us have received just a standard reply to our letters and emails. We hope that with growing numbers joining with us in the Alliance we will be able to convince Mrs
