## Lower Speed Limits for Saltash

Saltash has been asked to join with other towns in Cornwall in seeking a universal 20 m.p.h. limit in streets where people and traffic mix.

A local company, group "20's plenty for Cornwall", used Global Road Safety Week to write to Saltash Town Council and others urging that "low speed streets save lives and are at the heart of any community". The limit they say would make for streets that are "Healthy, green and liveable, in other words streets for life"

National government is encouraging local councils to introduce 20 m.p.h. limits for residential streets and areas where cycle and pedestrian traffic is high such as around schools, shops, and parks, but so far has declined to introduce a mandatory limit nationally. Since 2009 it has been made easier and cheaper for local councils to introduce lower speed limit zones and, the campaigners say, the Police Commissioner for Devon and Cornwall supports the" 20's plenty for Cornwall" and believes campaign enforcement would be viable.

Saltash Town Council will be conferring with the local road safety group to consider its response to supporting the campaign.

# Deputy Mayor Richard Bickford Anticipates Challenging Year

The position of Mayor over the last year and the next is a challenging one and can only be done

with the full support of a Deputy Mayor", Councillor David Yates told the Council's annual town meeting. Since last year's deputy, Julie Rance, had not stood for re-election and new deputy had to be appointed and Councillor Yates was proposing Councillor Richard Bickford, the only nominee.

"The deputy must act as a sounding board when difficult decisions are to be made and I believe Councillor Bickford is well suited in experience and capabilities", he continued. He referred to the role played by Councillor Bickford in particular

in negotiating with various individuals and organisations towards a mutually acceptable outcome, the restoration of the former station building being the most prominent matter.

Councillor Bickford referred to the challenges of various things to deliver held up over the past year. In particular he hoped to see the station building completed and in use, the library delivering a great service, and continuing devolution improving the town facilities.

Councillor Bickford was elected with thirteen votes for, none against and one abstention.





# Chamber Chairman Sarah Martin *Keeping us Updated...*

ormally with my column I would launch straight into an update on Chamber activities but this time, it would be really remiss of me not to mark the passing of Chris Nicholls first and foremost.

A well-respected solicitor in the town, we learnt of his death in April with great sadness. Chris had dealt with the legal documentation of several of the bigger property deals in Saltash, also working closely with Saltash Town Council. He was Chairman of the Chamber from 1985 to 1987, and although not a regular attendee of our monthly meetings in recent years he was there when important matters were being discussed or would make sure his opinion was passed on. His passing is a very sad loss to the town and to town solicitors Nicholls and Sainsbury, and we would like to pay our respects here.

## Tamar Bridge resurfacing project It's safe to say that the

beginning of June has been a turbulent time as far as the roads are concerned with probably most of us affected by the start of resurfacing works on the Bridge, and many of us very indignant and vocal on social media about the chaos it has caused.

As a town councillor and Chair of Chamber I have received correspondence from various retailers and residents, all dismayed at the traffic queues and congestion, and at the impact this has had on the town especially on our businesses: one retailer told me his average revenue was down by 66 per cent in that first week, others were informed their stock couldn't be delivered as drivers couldn't take the risk of getting caught up in traffic, and many had customers who weren't prepared to make the journey in to Saltash due to the congestion and long queuing times

Any of you who follow the Chamber Facebook page will have noticed the regular updates on progress of the works. I think it's fair to say that the start couldn't have gone any worse but,

fortunately, the massive teething problems that were experienced during the first week and a half have for the most part been sorted, and updates have proved those invaluable in answering many questions about why certain things are happening in the

way they are. The first Tamar Bridge and Torpoint Ferry Joint Committee meeting of Plymouth City Council and Cornwall Council since the May election was held at the end of the second week of works, and many questions were asked about the disastrous start to the project highlighting issues such as the tag-only lanes not being open, toll booths remaining closed despite queues, problems recovering broken down vehicles after accidents, and merging issues with drivers trying to leave the A38 before the tunnel to rejoin it from the

town. Mv question to the Committee as Chair of Chamber was to ask for a public meeting (albeit most probably virtual) with retailers and residents alike. I think public engagement is an important part of ensuring residents are on board with such important and unavoidable works. I hope the Committee do consider going ahead with such a meeting so that all our concerns about the next few months can be dealt with. The daily updates have helped but the impact of the works on Saltash cannot be underestimated. Going forward, we will be using our position to ensure we are a key stakeholder in decisions around the Bridge that affect our town's retailers

The teams will continue to work on the Bridge 7 days a week from 7.30am - 7pm to make sure the deadline of 21st October is met. More updates in the next column or on our Facebook page.

## **Boat Park and** Slipway **Improvements** Sought

A local boatowner has raised concerns with Saltash Town Council concerning dangers in launching and security on shore at the town's Jubilee Green boat park and the slipway.

Especially with a strong current running and a northerly wind blowing it is impossible for one person and dangerous even for two people to launch there, he claims. There are no securing cleats and fenders to protect from danger. The is a solution he suggests 'gabion", a steel basket of stone, as has been used successfully on the River Fowey at Lostwithiel.

The park is not cheap to use, he further suggests, given the lack of water, electricity or security. A launching fee is proposed, with Saltash residents able to acquire a discount card for modest annual fee. This could help pay for a fulltime warden, perhaps based in a two-storey hut such as has been mooted, the ground floor of which could be franchised out as a café.

# Historic Pound a Heritage Site

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# **Tamar Reflections** The Tannery

few months ago, I wrote about the history of Saltash's golf courses, which included the fields leading down to Burraton Coombe.

This month, I would like to take you on another interesting journey of the old Tannery Burraton at Coombe

Burraton Coombe is already steeped in history as it abuts a variety of past industries, which once thrived along the valley running down to Forder, including the mill, a lime kiln, the quay and Jeffords's Quarry.

Burraton Coombe played a vital role in enterprise too, with its tanning industry; the process of treating skins and hides of animals to produce leather.

The Tannery came to Burraton Coombe via Mr S.C. Adams, during the Victorian period (1830s) which started beside the Latch brook at the bottom of Tor Hill.

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There other were impressive buildings to support the industry further down as the tannery expanded during the 1840s Evidence still remains with Tanyard House (now Lynher House), and of course next door, the old Tannery building at the bottom of Fairmead Road, which is one of the last impressive buildings remaining at Burraton Coombe; now an integrated part of a small and recent housing scheme (more in a moment on that).

South of this building is the 'round house', where in times of drought, which would have put the water wheel out of action, a horse harnessed to a beam would walk round and round to work the various rollers of the bark mill where the barks of oak, chestnut, and other species were crushed before being put into the tanning pits.

Burraton Coombe still boasts old oak and chestnut trees, and in the nearby woods which almost certainly must have some bearing on the tree planting schemes for the tanning bark during those times Due to hard times and

other family reasons, the Adams family sold the Tanneries and subsequently the business changed hands more than once. The family that eventually

bought the tanneries in the 1870s, which ran it until 1920s, that are more known to many of us were the Thomas brothers and William Nancarrow. They



came from the ancient family business tanning at Grampound, in Cornwall. Thomas married a local girl Miss Boden whose family ran the Post Office at

Burraton Coombe. Interestingly, one of their ancestors the late Mona (Nancarrow) became the Mayor of Saltash in the

1990's, and I had the great pleasure of serving with Mona during my time on Saltash Town Council. Mona was a great character, and the stories she could tell, would fill 'Tamar Reflections'

every month! What prompted me to feature the Burraton Coombe Tannery this month, was that I recently came across another of our archives promoting the sale of the Fannery and site during 1990, which stated (in part)

#### For Sale by Private Treaty -The Tannery, Burraton Coombe, Saltash

The old Tannery building comprises of a fine imposing stone built structure with slated roof and we understand is currently listed as a building of architectural and historic interest Grade 11. The bark house held supplies of oak bark in the northern half of the building and upper floored end to the building was used for fleshing and hides. The building remained in the ownership of the Nancarrow family until 1988 when it was purchased by G H Webber Ltd. who have obtained planning consent a most attractive redevelopment of the site.

#### Price reduced and offers in excess of £125,000 are invited

This has now been developed as a settlement and is most sympathetic to the amazing history of this sensitive site of times past.

The supporting ancient photograph (copy) was given to us some years ago by our dear late friend Cornelius Hearl (another former Mayor), who was born at Burraton Coombe, who rescued the photo from the site piggery. In the photo you will see the old Tannery, the old Post Office, the Alms Cottages and Castle Farm House (in the fore front). Also note all the open spaces and fields that have now been developed.

### Chris Nicholls



Tributes have poured in for Chris Nicholls, a pre-eminent Saltash solicitor and pillar of the community, who died in April at the age of 71.

Coming from a devout Catholic family, Chris was an altar boy at the Roman Catholic Church in Saltash and kept his faith throughout his life. After attending St. Boniface College, he went on to study at the College of Law in Guildford, and started his legal career with Blight, Broad and Skinnard in Saltash, where he remained for 20 years before setting up the law firm Nicholls and Sainsbury in 1988 together with Janet Sainsbury. In her eulogy at Chris' funeral, Janet paid tribute to Chris' professional integrity and his inspirational mentorship, encouraging many in the legal profession.

It was at Blight, Broad and Skinnard that Chris met Elaine, and the couple were married in 1976. Chris was a thoughtful, kind family man, devoted to his wife and two sons. Daniel and Richard. Chris was also an active and
