olin Breed passed away recently, leaving a legacy of community service that will be remembered for years to come. I was honoured to be asked by the

family, to pay tribute to Colin at the memorial service held in Saltash Welsey Church. I am grateful to have the opportunity to share some of this with you.

Colin had a remarkable ability to unite people for a common cause, a talent that became evident in the mid-1980s when the old Wesley building was in dire need of repair. Understanding the need for a new place of worship,

Colin led the project to redevelop the site, ultimately leading to the construction of the church building that stands proud at the top of Fore Street today. Colin estimated the cost of the new church to be around £600,000.

His expertise in merchant banking was crucial in securing the necessary funds - he personally negotiated the sale of the land where Greenwich Place now stands for the sum of £250,000. An additional £150,000 came from church funds, with the remaining £200,000 being raised by the dedicated efforts of church members.

A key element in the fundraising was the Church group PALS, formed in 1981 to support young families. Colin's leadership and enthusiasm inspired the group, fostering a spirit of community and cooperation that saw families working tirelessly to achieve the fundraising target. The bonds formed during this period became a testament to Colin's ability to bring people together.

Colin purchased a 16-seater bus for the Church, with the memorable registration VET 252. The registration plate was probably worth more than the bus itself, but the bus played a pivotal role, not only in community outings but also in fundraising activities. We sold refreshments from the bus from a layby on the A38, and

transported the catering team from Wesley to dish up food at various events across Southeast Cornwall, helping us raise funds to build our new Church.

But Colin's dedication extended far beyond his local community. During his 13 years in Parliament, he was known for his strong sense of commitment and service. He was a champion for justice. always ready to tackle any issue. His parliamentary career was marked by unwavering dedication to his constituents and integrity in public service. After retiring from Parliament, he was a regular visitor to the Middle East, working to promote Arab-British understand-

Colin's contributions to his community and his country were profound. The Wesley Church stands as a tangible reminder of his vision and drive, but his efforts also brought people together, creating a legacy of community cohesion.

His work on earth is now complete, and he can rest in peace. As we walk past the Wesley Church and remember Colin, we carry his memory in our hearts. His legacy will live on in the community he served so well. Rest in peace, Colin. May God be always with you.

It's such an honour to be your Mayor, and I'd like to thank everyone for your friendship, love, encouragement and support. I'd like to think that you all know that I will do my very best for the town that I love.

I have listened carefully over the last five years to residents' needs, and apart from fulfilling our current, exciting projects, together with my fellow councillors and with the help of our brilliant staff I will also be looking for more funding opportunities to further enhance our town.

I'm supporting our healthcare and dental groups to work towards a health hub to save us travelling over the Bridge. It's important that our town becomes a dementia and disabled friendly community, accepting everyone, no matter what their disability.

I'd like to encourage a "Be proud of our Town" initiative, talking to schools and community groups, to help stop vandalism, littering and the most common complaint: dog poo!!

I'm so looking forward to working alongside our new Deputy Mayor, Councillor Rachel Bullock. We have remarkably similar ideas and values; we are also good friends and neighbours. I know that I will have her support and we'll make an effective team, along with our fellow councillors.

By now, the ferry to Royal William Yard will be in operation and we hope to encourage many residents in Plymouth to come to our town to see what great shops we have locally. This has come about after being awarded Community Levelling Up funding to allow the Town Council to run a Transport Trial Day at Easter. Also, D-Day 80 will have happened by the time you read this. It's important to

remember that there were army camps in Saltash. Many of these troops crossed the River Tamar, and left for the Normandy beaches along with the 36,000 troops from Saltash Passage. The lighting of the beacon and our lights of peace symbolised our hopes and prayers that something like this will never happens again. I'd also like to thank the Knit and Natter groups, craft groups and swimming groups who knitted and crocheted lots of poppies and flowers to decorate Fore Street, as well as the RBL for the poppy decorations.

I'm always out and about, shopping, walking the Mayoral dog, or working in Victoria Gardens with volunteers. Please stop for a chat with me, or with any other councillor, especially on the Meet Your Councillor days held outside Superdrug on Fore Street, on the second Saturday of the month.

uch has changed at Saltash Town Council since I was first elected to represent the old East Ward back in 2017. I remember somebody saying to me back then, that it was a bit of a waste of time, as the Town Council didn't really do much. Even if there was an element of truth back then, the reality is that the Town Council has taken on much more responsibility over the past few years and now does a great deal of work for the benefit of residents.

Devolution from Cornwall Council has handed us the Library or Library Hub as it is now called, no longer being just a place to borrow books, but also a hive of activity with many events throughout the year.

The Town Council now runs a small fleet of vehicles, the latest of which is 100% electric, enabling our team of Service Delivery General Assistants to undertake a multitude of tasks around the town. By the time you read this, the railway station waiting room will be open for the benefit of travellers and casual visitors who will be able to purchase snacks and refreshments from the Trackside Café. Moreover, it is now possible to travel from Saltash to the Royal William Yard in Plymouth, using the new Saltash Ferry which leaves the Jubilee Green Pontoon at 90-minute intervals daily.

During my time with the Town Council, it has been a privilege and a pleasure to serve as Mayor of Saltash, being the first to serve 21 months due to Covid-19 restrictions, since the Town Council was formed in 1974



when it replaced the old Saltash Corporation. For the coming year I will serve as Vice-Chair of the Policy and Finance Committee, having recently been re-elected to that position by my fellow Councillors. I have also for the last couple of years acted as Vice-Chair of the Services Committee, under the stewardship of Cllr Julia Peggs who is the new Mayor for 2024-25.

Together with mv wife Brenda, who is also a Town Councillor and Chair of the Planning and Licensing Committee, we run a business that is based in the town that we also are proud to call home. My spare time, such as it is, being taken up by my passion for radio broadcasting, having presented on a number of radio stations in the South and South West, which I continue to do whilst playing music from my favourite era which can be categorised as late 1950s through to the late 1970s.

New Ferry Service Linking Royal William Yard and Saltash

lymouth Boat Trips has introduced a new, daily water transport link connecting Saltash and Royal William Yard in Plymouth.

Operating from 24th May to 30th September, the service was introduced following positive feedback for the trial ferry service run as part of Saltash Town Council's Connectivity Day at Easter. The 70-capacity foot passenger ferry leaves from Jubilee Pontoon, which is managed by Saltash Town Council under a tenancy arrangement with Cornwall Council, headed for Royal William Yard every 1.5 hours, with the first ferry leaving at 10am and the last at 6pm.

Owner of Plymouth Boat Trips, Ben Squire, said: 'We're thrilled to be working with Saltash Town Council to deliver this important new service for commuters and tourists alike. Water transport is not only an enjoyable way to travel, but is also a more sustainable choice. meaning less traffic and congestion on our roads.'

With Bervl Bike docking bays close to Jubilee Pontoon and in Royal William Yard, passengers have the option of hiring e-bikes for their onward Depending on journeys. passenger numbers, there is a possibility that a connecting bus service might be introduced from Saltash Waterside to the town centre, providing an extra boost to the Saltash economy.

The Mayor of Saltash Councillor Julia Peggs, thanked Cornwall Council, Urban Splash and Plymouth City Council for their support in the new venture before going on to say: "The Town Council is pleased to be working in partnership with Plymouth Boat Trips to offer an additional form

of transport to residents and visitors. Our aim is to further grow transport links in to Saltash town centre, helping residents make more sustainable choices about how they travel and boosting our local economy.'

The full ferry timetable is available on the Saltash Town Council website as well as on the Plymouth Boat Trips website, which also has an advanced online booking system covering all Plymouth Boat Trips' services including cruises, ferries, and fishing trips. A single adult fare costs

Cat Nav

A new law effective from 10th June requires all cats to be microchipped before they reach 20 weeks old. Owners whose cat is found without a microchip will have 21 days to comply or face a fine of up to £500.

Designed to help lost cats get reunited with their owners, a microchip is about the size of a grain of rice, and is inserted under a cat's skin in a process that is no more painful than an injection. Costs vary, typically £20-£30, but may be lower through local vets or rescue centres

Recent challenges, though COVID the including lockdown and the loss of key members including Tower Captain John White, have led to a temporary halt in regular Sunday ringing. The Church is now calling for anyone with experience or interest to get in touch to help build a new team of bellringers.

The six bells have a proud, long history of marking events. Three of them date back to 1760, installed in time to mark the coronation of George III. In 1959, a cracked bell was recast, and all the bells were rehung in a new metal frame. The bellringing tradition thrived, peaking in 1973 with a team of 33 enthusiasts. Structural issues with the bell tower halted ringing, however, until 1996, when Reverend Brian, supported Pamela Dorrington, Sir Vernon Seccombe and others raised £37,000 to restore the tower. Post-Covid challenges in rebuilding the bellringing team have been compounded by the frayed condition of the bell ropes. Crafting new ropes is a costly task, requiring great skill. So in addition to the appeal for new bellringers, the church has a fundraising appeal to replace the ropes. The initial response has been encouraging, and it is hoped that the new ropes, featuring a special Cornish design, will be installed by autumn.

As the church community works to restore regular ringing, they remember Reverend Brian's dedication. With new ropes and renewed enthusiasm, they aim to ensure the bells will continue to ring out, marking events and bringing the community

Sustainable Saltash

A regular column on changes Saltash residents are making to confront climate and ecological breakdown.

This election will be a crucial one. Decisions made in the immediate period following the vote will set the trajectory of climate and environmental policy over the coming term. The years between now and 2030 are a narrowing window of opportunity for change, and the next government will be in power for most of that time

We've seen many records broken for climate and nature loss. We are witnessing an unprecedented mix of drought and water pollution that was unimaginable in this country just a few years ago, and blights us all. Thinking what else might be in store in the next 5 years really focuses the mind. I will be giving high priority to nature recovery, water management and climate adaptation this election year. Wise policy and judicious funding can transform a runaway train into a driving force to improve our lives and economy. Yes, it

will be costly in some ways and will mean change, but bring it on I say. Goodness knows change is needed and at what cost further neglect?

The first thing to say is I will definitely be voting. I always do, but this time it is so crucial. Please vote. Even if just to earn another 5 years on your winging license. If you don't join in you can't winge. So how to use that vote wisely? Wisdom is born of knowledge and knowledge is easy to come by in today's society, as long as one seeks out a credible source.

I plan to look at our current representation, and review their voting history on issues which mean most to me. This is easily done.

Theyworkforyou.com is an online resource where you can see all this information in one place, sorted into categories such as environment, education, housing, health. Very illuminating.

I then plan to inform myself about the candidates standing in my area. I will read with interest the local press and digest the available information on their websites. Find out what their priorities are. It will help to see them answer questions directly. Cornwall Wildlife Trust have announced they will be holding nature and climate hustings. Ours was to be in September, but the election has been called earlier than anticipated, so keep an eye on their website for more.

Regarding political parties, manifestos will be published. Sounds daunting, but for those who have not previously dived into one, they are surprisingly compact and user friendly.

I will be looking for cohesive strategy, not token words or gestures. I want us to reach 2030 in one piece. I want to look out over the Tamar and not wonder what is going on beneath the surface. I want my community to be healthier, richer in nature and with a viable plan to manage the challenges we can't now avoid in the coming decades, and can no longer ignore. There won't be a perfect choice, but there will be one that stands out as better than the rest.



General Election 4th July 2024 Invitation to Comment

Q1 - What have you done to stop dentists in SE Cornwall leaving the NHS?

Across UK dentists are choosing not to be NHS registered, leaving unspent budget of £25 million! The Government pays £28 per single check up, to multiple fillings. This is not enough to retain or recruit new dentists. Dentists have huge costs and investment, as would most people, then choose the best income opportunity. If dentists keep leaving; clearly the fees applied to their services is not enough! It is basic economics, the fees per NHS treatment need to be higher and maybe a lovalty bonus based upon how many new NHS patients especially children and pensioners the practice provides for.

O2 - What have you done to persuade your party to abolish the Tamar Tolls? Obviously a easy vote grabber to agree but here's my

TBTF joint committee accounts are £3.466 million in deficit out of £15.419m income, they're not ripping off the motorist. Responsibility of funding the bridge and ferries onto Plymouth and Cornwall councils may put the risks with the all tax payers? Do we trust two separate councils to manage such an important section of infrastructure for this region? Councils are struggling with other commitments, what would happen if they went bankrupt? Should TBTF become toll free the congestion and pollution will increase, clogging local roads, whilst tourists will contribute nothing.

O3 - Families and businesses in SE Cornwall care about the environment but many are struggling with the cost of living. What have you done to help them afford to

We care about the environment especially clean air, food and pure water, it's a fundamental cornerstone for a healthy society but we should question climate change agenda!

Environmental taxes raised £52.5 billion with 75% from our energy costs, with duty 63% of fuel cost. Hidden environmental taxes increased cost of living, hurting the most economically vulnerable hardest, stifling growth, hindering access to employment. Environmental taxes should be assessed and dropped should they cause pressure on cost of living. Gas and electricity standing charges could be scrapped paying only for usage, excessive profits of energy companies used to reduce prices.

Colin Martin (Lib Dem)

Q1 - What have you done to stop dentists in SE Cornwall leaving the NHS?

In 2006, Labour introduced a new contract which does not pay dentists fairly for the time taken to deliver complex treatment. Since then, dentists have steadily left the NHS. Last year Lostwithiel's practice owner told me he had lost one of his NHS dentists and was on the verge of losing them all. I personally contacted the Chief Executive of Cornwall's NHS and urged her to negotiate a contract which paid dentists by the hour for complex work. She agreed, and all Lostwitheil's NHS dentists signed up, not just to stay with the NHS but to tackle Cornwall's waiting list.

O2 - What have you done to persuade your party to abolish the Tamar Tolls? For too long, Cornwall has accepted the Government line: "We could fund the bridge, but then you'd be stuck with a loss-making ferry". As Leader of the Liberal Democrats on

different line: "Saltash and Torpoint are uniquely dependent on their neighbouring city, and the £18m cost of funding the bridge and the ferry is so tiny that it's not even a rounding error on the Government's budget (0.001%)". I successfully made the case to colleagues, first in West Cornwall, then the Westcountry, then Westminster. Full Government funding is now official national Liberal

in SE Cornwall care about the environment but many are struggling with the cost of living. What have you done to help them afford to cut their carbon footprint? The homes and businesses with the lowest energy bills are those with well-insulated buildings, fossil-free heating systems, solar panels and batteries. But the up-front costs mean that these options are only available to those with large amounts of spare cash or access to affordable credit. I have used my position on Cornwall Council to push for low-interest loans to be made available to all. This service was launched in April in partnership with Lendology CIC, offering loans at 4% interest, meaning that the monthly repayments can be covered by the reduction in energy bills. elected in 2025 to identify a proper long-term solution rather than posturing with letters, a statement in Parliament and a Petition.

O3 - Families and businesses in South East Cornwall care about the environment, but many are struggling with the cost of living. What have you done to help them afford to cut their carbon footprint? I understand the challenges facing people in the UK. The cost-of-living increase is, in part, being fuelled by net zero initiatives. A new heat pump system costs £12,000; and uses more power than a gas boiler costing £900. An electric vehicle costs £50,000 plus, there is no second-hand market, car insurance is significantly higher, battery replacement is £10,000 plus and with them comes a huge carbon footprint as China uses coalfired power stations, and we conveniently ignore this fact. I will campaign for hydrogen production to support hydrogen boilers and car engines that produce water at a lower cost.

Reflections of a True Friendship

A special service celebrating the life of the late Colin Breed was held at the Saltash Wesley Methodist Church on Friday 24th May. This followed the funeral service on the same morning held at the Glynn Valley Crematorium.

Hosted by Colin's family, the Church was packed with

friends and colleagues past and present, all paying tribute to a man of faith, charity and dedicated service.

So proudly, I can reflect upon many decades of a true friendship with Colin and his wife Janet.

Colin was a former MP for South East Cornwall between 1997 and 2010, where upon he served his constituents with dedication, sincerity and indeed, never faltered in his continuous endeavours on behalf of his electorate.

Colin was also twice Mayor of Saltash, and I had the great honour of serving with Colin on Saltash Town Council for many years where he passed over the Mayoral Chain to me in 1996; this was following his additional year in office. Colin also represented Saltash on Caradon District Council until he took up his seat in Parliament.

I always found Colin to be kind and helpful in every way, no matter what was asked of him. Although Colin of course had a very public profile, which was important



to convey to his constituents of the work that he was undertaking on their behalf; there was also a very low profile of persona when undertaking roles to the betterment of Saltash in particular that he just got on with, and did behind the

Colin was quietly instrumental in the origination of the Saltash Youth Council (now Saltash Youth Network) furthermore the Saltash Music Speech and Drama Festival.

Colin was the leading light with the initiation, fund raising and the re-building of the new Saltash Wesley Methodist Church in Glebe Avenue, and also led the way for many of the friendship groups within the Methodist family, to name but a few.

During his time Westminster, amongst other things, Colin took on a pacifist role on behalf of Parliament, endeavouring to foster a greater understanding and to promote world peace; and in that role, undertook

Anniversary Account of D-Day in Saltash Library

The blend of perfect planning, dauntless heroism and considerable good luck which ensured the success of the greatest seaborn invasion in history formed a fascinating presentation given in Saltash library eighty years after the momentous events

Former Commando Barry Brooking, gave an overall account of the planning and performance of Operation Overlord, concentrating especially on the role played by the local area.

The 160,000 assault troops who embarked on D-Day aboard 7,000 ships included many from Devon and Cornwall, including a large contingent from Saltash Passage. Saltash played a part with an amphibious repair base sited at Sand Quay, while residents with accommodation took American troops. With their extra rations they were welcome guests and Saltash's hospitality was acclaimed.

While the operation ultimately led to the liberation of Hitler's Fortress Europe, Mr. Brooking described how easily it could have failed. The invasion was postponed due to stormy weather and a further four postponement was threatened

However, Colin would be the first person to say that he was not perfect by any means and there are many of us that could vouch for that! As Colin did not suffer what he would consider as inadequacies and inefficiencies easily; and he would let us all know his thoughts as a result during those rare moments of frustration!

I could fill this paper with stories of Colin's talent, goodwill, sincerity, service. humility, humanity and fault. A man of faith, hope and charity to the very end.

Colin will be a great loss not only to the people of Saltash and South East Cornwall. but to Countries around parts of the world that he did his level best to foster longpeace lasting understanding.

- by which time the Atlantic Wall could have been further reinforced. It was 'Maureen of Mayo', an Irish weather observer, who recorded a 12-24 hour window of good weather - enough for the invasion to proceed. 
