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Cornwall and Plymouth Vote to Increase Tamar Tolls

ornwall and Plymouth City Councils have voted in favour of applying for a 15% increase in the Tamar tolls, which will see charges rise to £1.50 for TAG holders and £3 for drivers paying in cash. The vote in Cornwall was won by just two votes. It came at the end of a heated debate with pleas from councillors across the political spectrum for the increase to be denied. Councillors highlighted the ongoing financial

burden on SE Cornwall residents, where tag holders are already paying around £3.5 million per year in tolls.



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With 33 in favour and 12 against, the Plymouth City Council vote means that an application can be made to the Secretary of State for Transport for the increase. Against the political backdrop of the petition launched by SE Cornwall MP Sheryll Murray asking the government not to support the increase, however, Cornwall Council's Portfolio Holder for Transport Cllr. William-Pears amended the motion to include a delay of 55 days before submitting the application to give MPs time to make approaches to government for financial

Tamar Tolls Action Group's

support.

Scott Slavin commented: "Whilst it remains disappointing, Cornwall's 38-36 vote is a significant step change in our favour, and in popular opinion. We take heart from this as it means our campaign is gathering momentum, with the public and local politicians alike finally beginning to recognise that change is not only necessary, it is inevitable."

Town Clock Ticking Again!

altash Town Council is pleased to announce that the town's Jubilee clock is now working and telling the time to everyone who visits Fore Street. The clock was installed to celebrate the Golden Jubilee of the Late Queen Elizabeth II in 2002. It will light up at midnight and midday for one minute and will be continuously lit between 4pm -11pm each day. The Town Council have signed up to a service level agreement to ensure the ongoing maintenance of the important town

Saltash Public Conveniences

Town Council have Saltash approved to sub-contract the cleaning, opening and closing of the town's public conveniences on a three-monthly rolling contract.

The use of the contractor will enable the existing Service Delivery Team to focus their attention to other duties, an example being grounds maintenance for areas that are the responsibility of the Town Council, including Churchtown and St Stephens cemetery and land at Pillmere Estate

Park public Longstone conveniences will remain closed during the winter period as a result of vandalism to the site. All other facilities will be open 8.30am -5.00pm during the winter period and 8.30am - 7.00pm during the summer period.

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Councillor Richard Bickford welcomed the unanimous decision, saying "I am pleased that we are able to extend our support for large, free events in our town. I believe this shows considerable commitment and we hope that this helps to put them on a more secure financial footing". He further adds, "I would like to pay tribute to these events, which are predominantly run by a small core of dedicated

Karen Lilley, Chair of Saltash Regatta reacted to the announcement "The Saltash Regatta committee are delighted hear the to announcement that Saltash Town Council has increased the amount allocated within the new budget to support for Saltash applications events

With the prices increasing every year, it is becoming increasing difficult to raise the funds needed to keep the events going. This increase will make a huge difference to help with the financial pressure of running events, like the Saltash Regatta. We have always had great support from Saltash Town Council and feel very grateful that they have made this change."

Hilary Frank, Committee Member of the Saltash Christmas Festival was delighted and said "Organising the Saltash May Fair and Christmas Festival is a logistical challenge, but the biggest headache for us as volunteers is getting finance for the events

We try to keep expenditure down but each event still costs about £8,000 per day to deliver. Saltash Town Council has been hugely supportive in the past, allowing us to bid for a maximum of £1,500 per day. I am thrilled and relieved that the Town Council has recognised not just the spiralling costs but also the value of the festivals and the efforts of the volunteers by increasing the maximum we can bid for to £2,500 per day. This enhanced collaboration

goes a long way to helping ensure the success of the events, and we are truly grateful to the Town Council for their support."

The Town Council have two funding opportunities available, a Festivals Fund and Community Chest Fund, and in recent years the Festivals Fund has supported many popular events in the town, such as Saltash Regatta, May Fair. Christmas Festival and the Tincombe Tea Party.

Maximum Increase for Cornwall Council

ornwall portion of the Council Tax will rise by 4.99% for the second year in a row. This is the maximum increase allowed by central government without the need for a referendum, and comes as the Council struggles to make massive savings. It includes 2% for an Adult Social Care Precept to provide the money so desperately needed for adult social care services.

Cornwall Council's Deputy Leader, Cllr. David Harris, warned it was imperative that Cornwall Council received "fair and proper funding from central government" or else it would need to file a notice for bankruptcy in a couple of years

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
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

To be able to continue to preserve and maintain services for the community of Saltash it is necessary to increase your Council Tax for 2024/2025 by 4.81%.

ave you received your new bins? According www.cornwall.gov.uk, weekly food waste and fortnightly rubbish collection will help us waste less and recycle more. I wonder how much anybody really expects this to achieve apart from, hopefully, a small reduction in collection costs.

Isn't waste reduction (or, problematically, proliferation!) something that happens further upstream? Mightn't this be another Central example of Government refusing to promote more meaningful shifts towards long-term sustainability by imposing restrictions at the source?

I am merely speculating. As I've mentioned in a previous column, true sustainability requires engagement in a far more open and constructive conversation regarding the issues affecting our lives as a

result of climate collapse than any of our politicians appear inclined to acknowledge. These will not be comfortable or easy conversations; we have things we need to discuss well beyond how frequently we may or may not have our bins emptied. We will need to listen as well as to talk, and spend as much if not more time defining our problems, rather than jumping straight into arguing how best to solve them.

Sounds scary? Or maybe exciting? I expect to enjoy coming together with fellow residents of Saltash as a concerned community a lot more than I expect to enjoy listening to any party-political electioneering that might be about to break out. Frankly, I have arrived at a point where I am pretty much disgusted with the lot of them, and anxious beyond measure that our highly adversarial political system is so poorly suited to handling our current situation. Fewer and fewer of the things we care most about are working properly. But simply

getting together for a decent chat, remembering just how much more we all have in common than makes us different? Yes. I believe that might provide a much-needed fresh start.

The coming together I am referring to is an inaugural Popular Assembly that will be taking place right here in Saltash. 'empowering everyday people to make collective decisions about the everyday issues that are most affecting us'. I wish I could tell you when and where it's scheduled to take place but that won't be decided until after this column has gone to

I'd also love to be able to tell you a whole lot more about what to expect, except that it seems likely that will depend on the particular interests of whoever chooses to turn up.

It might qualify as kind of a whacky invitation, but do please come and join in with an event that has yet to be scheduled but could potentially make a world of difference.

Voice of Saltash **Patients**

hocking is a much overused word in the world at the moment, however the lack of NHS dentists in Saltash and more widely in SE Cornwall is indeed a shocking situation for local patients. It is a shock for most people when they have to pay quite large sums of money for routine or urgent treatment. But what should not be forgotten is that they have already paid once for this treatment through taxes. It is not just shocking: it is a scandal.

The problem goes back many years, and is based in the "dental contract" which has not been reformed despite promises in the Government's 2010 manifesto. Now most dentists have stopped doing work for the NHS, so the local Integrated Care Board has not been able to spend its budget to pay for dental services. Our local Health Action Group suggested imaginative ways to create new services by using this unspent money on a mobile dental surgery. Now we have been told that this money has been taken away for other services.

We are not going to give up on this locally. We are presuming that there will be money in the local NHS budget in the new financial year, and we will put together new proposals. Interestingly, our ideas seem to be mirrored in the government's last-minute Dental Recovery Plan, which does make some more money available - if it can be spent! We are particularly keen to work with partners to support the young and the vulnerable who have not been seen by a dentist in recent years.

The Action Group is determined to improve Saltash patients' access to an NHS dentist. Please send us your own ideas, and ask your councillors and MP to back us openly. And we look forward to your comments on our proposals.

One other thing....as far as we know, there is no new investment planned in other NHS services in the town. Last year Bodmin got a multi-purpose Community Diagnostic Centre; St Austell is getting a £15 million new local surgical centre; Newquay is having a major modernisation of its X-Ray service; and now GP Hubs to provide additional appointments are being created just in eight towns, but mainly in the far west of Cornwall (Bodmin is nearest). This is another scandal, specifically disadvantaging Saltash. We now know of one Saltash patient recently discharged from Derriford, who, having been discharged home, was sent to Camborne Hospital (ves. Camborne) when they fell ill again after a few days. We have no short-term beds in the town to deal with this common problem. This cannot go on. Please help us pursue a better service

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Chamber Chairman Peter Ryland Keeping us Updated

o many things have happened since my last report that I have difficulty in knowing where to start. First, the Town Team was successful in achieving some further funding, from the Accelerator Fund, which is enabling us to progress the ideas of street markets and seating areas in Fore Street. We will be consulting with the 7th December featuring Fore Street traders in March as to the more definitive proposals and, if there is general approval, we are hopeful that a trial will start in early summer. We have also applied for more funding in order to start the process of 'greening' Fore Street

It has been customary that the Town Council arranges for the Christmas lights to be switched on at the Christmas Festival, which is always on first Saturday

Saturday is the 7th December, which would mean that the lights will be on for less than three weeks. Chamber members asked me to write to

the Town Council asking if this could be changed, and I am pleased to report that the switching on of the lights will be on 15th November. The Chamber will now try and arrange a late-night opening of shops and some entertainment on that evening so put the date in your diary. The Chamber will still host the Festival on firm favourites including Santas on Bikes, Santa Fun Run and the Lantern Parade, subject to finding the funding.

Funding for events generally has also been under discussion December. This year, the first last month. Although the Chamber runs only the Christmas Festival it became evident that the May Fair and the Regatta are also have difficulty finding sufficient funds each year, so we are looking at ways to fund for the future as it is obvious from the people attending that these events are well enjoyed by the community and there is a wish for them to continue.

There was some sadness that Community Enterprises (CEPL12) had to take the decision to withdraw its Hopper Bus services. Since its inception, the Hopper has served the community well and had been the flagship of CEPL12 for many years, but following the resignation due to ill health of the Hopper director it was felt it was time to move on. We have organised a 'thank you' celebration to all those involved with the Hopper from when it was an idea in the mind of Colin Brown to the current day.

Although Chamber has been active in working behind the scenes, we have not had a formal meeting for the last couple of months as key been members have unavailable due to other We have commitments. continued to monitor events in and around Saltash and, in particular, the situation regarding the tolls on the Tamar Crossings. We submitted our views to the consultation late last year, but it was obvious that tolls had to rise in order that the Bridge could continue to subsidise



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Making Saltash Waterside Better Connected



People who live and work in Saltash are being asked for their views about how to improve the connections between Saltash Waterside, the town centre and destinations along the Tamar.

From **22nd March to 7th April**, Saltash Town Council will be consulting the public on the ideas developed so far and asking for the public to get involved.

This project is specifically looking at the feasibility of:

- Sustainable, innovative and traditional transport options linking the town centre to Saltash Waterside;
- Reintroducing water transport locally and along the River Tamar and beyond:
- Circular routes linking existing footpaths, cycle routes, railway and bus routes;
- Public realm and infrastructure improvements.
