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'Legend' Nigel Tookey Celebrated as Unsung Hero

football coach Nigel Tookey was recognised at the opening of May Fair when he was presented with the Unsung Hero Award, cheered on by the 'lions' and 'tigers' of the newly formed Saltash Girls' Under-11 football teams

Tony Truscott, coach of the Saltash Lions team, said: "Nigel has been an inspirational role model to the Saltash football community for more than 35 years. His enthusiasm has led to generations of young people developing a love for playing football and forming lasting friendships.

Last year, Nigel wrote to all the primary schools in Saltash with the suggestion of starting a Saltash Youth Girls football team. Such was the response that he has been training over 30 girls twice a week, teaching teamwork and respect through sport and providing support, especially important in the wake of the global pandemic.

The Unsung Hero Award



was presented by Carol Emmet, whose achievements in supporting people living with dementia were recognised by Saltash Town Council earlier this year when she was chosen as Saltash Citizen of the Year.

Minutes earlier, the lions and tigers had excitedly led the May Fair Parade of Youth down Fore

Street. Nigel had volunteered to walk with the girls, completely unaware that he was due to be presented with the Unsung Hero Award. "The girls are really grateful to Nigel for all he does, and were so excited about the Award. I'm proud and surprised that they managed to keep it a secret from him," said Tony. "The look on Nigel's face when the girls announced from the stage that he was the recipient was glorious. Nigel freely gives so much of his time to encourage young players, volunteering with football coaching at Burraton School, too. He is absolutely selfless and a thoroughly deserving recipient of the Unsung Hero Award. An absolute legend.

Having spent the last couple of years driving forward the Station Refurbishment project, my fellow councillors will be pleased that I don't have any major goals this year. Mainly I would like to see the town council make sensible adjustments to address the climate emergency that still hangs over us, which roughly translates into being mindful of our surroundings and the impact of our actions, as well as more housekeeping efforts to reduce our energy use across our buildings and land.

The aforementioned Station Refurbishment project has taken a number of years to deliver. Building a groundswell of support, finding funding partners and a design and construction team, all takes time, but we now have a beautifully restored building that is starting to get more and more use. Please keep an eye out for events at Isambard House and across the town, and make efforts to support them. The Town Council are currently hosting a number of events, under the umbrella of the Green Dragon Festival, a Creative Kernow funding stream.

I write this only a week into the role, and already we have enjoyed the Mayfair, an amazing weekend, that saw a wide variety of activities in an around the Town Centre. It was good to see the Tamar Trotters working with the Mayfair committee organising a number

of running events, alongside stalls in Longstone Park on the Sunday. The whole weekend saw amazing support by the people of Saltash, so thank you.

The Town Council are pleased to have organisations like the Mavfair committee to run such events, and whilst we might have limited input into what goes on, we do provide significant levels of funding, to ensure the events can take place. This year both the Mayfair and Saltash Regatta in early September will receive almost £3,000 each from our Festivals Fund. The fund which supports, large free community events, will also support the Saltash Lions Jubilee celebrations on Saturday 4th June at Warfelton Green, and the Mayfair teams 'Big Jubilee Lunch' on Sunday

5th June in the Town Centre as part of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations.

The Town Council itself will be kicking off the 4 day holiday with a Firework display at Jubilee Green on the Waterside which will follow a beacon lighting and a rendition of the Jubilee Song. The bridges and river will provide a stunning backdrop to festivities. A road closure will be in place on parts of Old Ferry Road for some of that day to ensure crowd safety. You are all invited to take part in a parade from Victoria Gardens at 8.30pm down to the Waterside where we expect the fireworks to start at 9.50pm.

Great communication begins with connection

hat's a quote (from, erm, Oprah Winfrey...) which is helping me understand my ongoing frustration with policy decisions being taken at Cornwall Council. It's a quote that councillors in the Cabinet at Cornwall Council should really take to heart because along with fellow 'backbench' councillors here in South East Cornwall, I've felt a stark disconnect in recent months.

Take buses, for example. After hearing from so many of you about bus woes we fixed up a meeting with officers from Cornwall Council's transport team. They spoke openly of the huge financial pressures they are facing, telling us that in the transport funding round in autumn last year Cornwall calculated its need as £33 million but received just £17 million from the Department for Transport. We were told of how they had no option but to withdraw services and of how they have tried extremely hard to make sure there were no gaps in the service. If only they had communicated all of this with us as local councillors earlier we could have actively engaged with residents to explain the situation and worked with residents to ensure their views were incorporated before timetable changes were made

Mayor for Cornwall – at What Cost

Which brings me on to the government's requirement that if Cornwall Council wants to have additional powers we need to change the system of governance to one where all power is invested in a Mayor of Cornwall who is directly

elected through a separate vote (and is not a councillor).

If we adopt a directly elected mayor model it will be locked into place for ten years. Bristol moved to a directly elected mayor system in 2012. Ten years on, and the referendum earlier this month saw the city vote to scrap the system amid concerns about cost and effectiveness. Conservative councillor in Bristol is quoted as saying: "The mayoral model has proven a disaster for Bristol too much power at the whim of one individual."

Cornwall desperately needs a meaningful devolution deal, and we've been assured that the Leader and her team will be earnest in their negotiations to secure the best possible terms, but these negotiations are happening behind closed doors and backbench councillors like me have not even had sight of the devolution asks.

This lack of willingess to with local connect is already creating a democratic deficit. I'm willing to be persuaded otherwise, but at the moment I cannot see how taking decision making and local engagement even further from councillors and investing it in one individual as Mayor can redress that balance. Improving communication and making sure that backbench councillors are connected would be far cheaper and far more effective.

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Planting Trees, Planting Hope

mbitious plans to improve the urban environment and reduce pollution form the basis of the 'Tree Saltash' ampaign. From October this year a widespread scheme of tree planting is due to get underway, and the public is being asked to contribute with suggestions of where these 'Lungs of the Earth' might best be situated. The intention is to plant between houses and along road verges while ensuring that residents do not suffer loss of light or views

Saltash Library, as part of its Environment month, helped launch the scheme in April with a tree-themed talk and walk. Cornwall is comparatively rich in historic trees, advised Ben Norwood during his talk on Ancient and Veteran Trees. While the oldest trees in the world, on America's Pacific Coast, are believed to date back 5,000 years, it is believed that Hern's Oak in a former deer park near Callington is around 1,000 years old, while the Darley Oak at Darleyford on the edge of Bodmin Moor is acclaimed as around 900 years old. A sapling from this ancient tree was recently planted on Jubilee Green as part of Saltash's Platinum Jubilee commemoration. One of the town's registered historic trees is little-noticed sycamore by the track linking Saltash Community School with Bishop Cornish School

Cornwall still retains much ancient woodland, defined as that which has existed since at least 1600, with 'indicator species' of flowers such as wood anemone confirming the soil has been undisturbed over the centuries. Future generations should be able to enjoy far more woodland as the Forest for Cornwall plans include an additional 8,000 hectares of woodland by 2030.

The wide variety of trees already growing in and around the town centre were pointed out by Adrian White, one of Saltash's three tree wardens, as he led a walk from the library ending in Longstone Park. He was able to advise how trees can be encouraged to survive and flourish, avoiding harm by such factors as squirrels, voles and overenthusiastic strimming.

Those who took part are now able to distinguish such trees as Turkey Oak, Goat Willow, Black Poplar and Monterey Cypress, all found along a short stretch of urban Saltash. And while ash dieback poses a threat to around 90% of the species, one of the finest and most historic rows of ash trees in Cornwall grows along New Road near Pollards Way. Dockyardies' role in the **Falklands Conflict**

anniversary of the Falklands conflict have remained relatively silent about the part played locally in the preparation of the fleet that sailed from Plymouth to the South Atlantic.

Saltash Old Cornwall Society during their April meeting enjoyed a talk from Mr Bill Trevorrow, who played a major role in acquiring and fitting out the merchant vessels which formed the flotilla. As 'night shift foreman for all trades' he travelled to examine suitable ships as well as supervising the work that made them fit for the conflict, including the placing of a flight deck on the ill-fated 'Atlantic Conveyor'. He subsequently volunteered to travel to the Falklands as part of a team of twenty-four tradesmen. It was

Purple Glow Eliminates Drug Use in Public Toilets

The installation of ultra violet lighting has proved successful in leading to a decrease in intravenous drug use in the town's public toilets, it was reported at the town council's Services Committee.

Drug users cannot make accurate vein injections when under certain UV light frequencies, and the lighting installed makes identification impossible. There had not been an incident of a 'sharp' being reported since January. The town's Service Delivery Department is working alongside the 'We Are With campaign and providing notices in pubic toilets advising of safe needle exchange facilities

tash Green Dragon Festival

he months of May and June are seeing fire breathed into our cultural heritage as the first ever Saltash Green Dragon Festival unfolds. Taking its name from the plaque of a green dragon high above the entrance doors of the Saltash Co-op building, the Green Dragon events have been made possible through funding from Tresorys Kernow (meaning 'Cornish Treasures'), a project funded through the UK Community Renewal Fund and being delivered by Cornwall Museums Partnership and Creative Kernow. Details of events are being published on the Saltash Green Dragon Festival Facebook page, but here is a look at three pillar events.

Songs & Shanties Festival June 10th to 12th

The Festival kicks off by welcoming the youngest audiences to a Music Menagerie at Saltash Library. From Baby Sharks to Nellie the Elephant, pre-schoolers and their carers are invited to sing-along with instruments large and small. There is more singing that evening at a fun workshop of 'Shanties & Songs of Land & Sea' in Isambard House, while Saturday 11th June sees string and wind players from across South East Cornwall and Plymouth perform melodic new music by local composer Judy Whitlock in the elegant Guildhall.

The final day of the Festival features music from the very old to the very new, including Elizabethan music at Mary Newman's Cottage, and a live music and film screening of Heaven's Thunder featuring concert premiere excerpts from a film made of a show involving horses, riders and musicians The Festival is brought to a close at the historic Church of St Nicholas and St Faith with acclaimed Early and World music group Sirinu celebrating the jubilee year of Elizabeth II with a performance of lively tunes from the time of Elizabeth I. Lindsay Endean, Festival Director and Saltash resident, said: "This will be a great weekend for discovering new music and exploring Saltash with friends and family. ecological crisis. Our import reliant society is relatively unprepared for hard times ahead. One thing we can all do is grow something. Whether it's a tree or a tomato in a pot. Even what you might have traditionally seen as weeds are vitally important to preserve. Dandelion leaves are at their best now for adding to salads. The flowers are great for pollinators. Why try to get rid of them? Our allotment was for a long

time overgrown with head-high brambles. This is why Saltash Town Council asked us to step in. Brambles are a food source and shelter for small birds. The loss of this habitat has led to the decline of many species including nightingales. I am sad they had to be cleared but the rules for allotments are clear. keep it 'cultivated'. Still too many people see them as a nuisance, though I have yet to hear anyone complain when given a jar of homemade bramble ielly.

Immediately after the brambles were cut grasses and other deep-rooted plants sprang up. These bring nutrients closer to the surface. The legacy of the bramble cover is a rich, crumbly top layer of loam, perfect for perennials and fruit bushes. We've experimented with a natural clearing method, laying a deep mulch of cardboard, manure, and straw. The results are good. Half our plot now looks like a traditional allotment. The other half is our

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Tamar Reflections

Oueen Elizabeth II

Elizabeth acceded to the Throne on February 1952. ring the untimely death of her father King George Vl. It was while her and her husband the (late) Duke of Edinburgh, was staying at a remote Treetops in Kenya. Her Majesty arrived back in London the following day to be met by her Minister, Winston Churchill; and after meeting with her grandmother Queen Mary, who was waiting for her at Palace; Buckingham immediately plans were being made for Elizabeth's Accession and Coronation. 2 June 1953 Princess Elizabeth's Coronation took

The streets were lined with hundreds of thousands of people, many of whom had camped out throughout the previous night to make sure they had their pitch to witness the amazing spectacle of royal pageantry.

place at Westminster Abbev.

All over the land people celebrated with street parties and organised events, and for the first time, the events of the day were televised, giving millions of people across the world the opportunity to witness the Coronation ceremony with all its pomp and circumstance fit for our new Queen. I was just a young girl and my parents rented a television from Rediffusion so that our family could watch the spectacle. I was spellbound and made a scrapbook of the event. which I still have to this day!

Saltash steeped in its own extraordinary history has organised and has been the scene many celebratory festivities going back at least over 130

In 1893 there was a joyous

King Georg V, then Duke of York marriage. There were joyful celebrations under the Mayoralty of Mr. P.E.B. Porter; the event was held in the old Recreation Field, which was situated just above the old Wesley Chapel in Saltash Fore Street. The Chapel was bombed in April 1941, and is now situated in Glebe Avenue.

In 1897 was the Diamond Jubilee of her late Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria. The celebrations were again held in the old Recreation Field. Followed by the permanent memorial to Queen Victoria -



Victoria Gardens. There were also mementoes for the children during the tea mugs, Mayoralty of Mr. W. Dusting.

August 1902 saw Coronation of King Edward VII, who was popularly known as the Peacemaker. Alderman R.T. Meadows was the Mayor, and the celebrations were held in the new Recreation Field at Longstone. The festivities included a procession, sports, and a meat tea for everyone, and a bonfire to complete the day.

June 22nd 1911 the Borough celebrated the accession of George V to the throne. The townsfolk zealously co-operated in arranging a series of festivities in which the Mayor Alderman Miller took a leading role, and presented medals of the Coronation to school children, the teachers and members of the Committee. A procession, tea,

bonfire and much more was thoroughly enjoyed. May 1935 the Borough held

its celebration of the Silver Jubilee of their Majesties King George V and Queen Mary; again with processions, a Service at the Flagstaff, teas and a bonfire and much more! Medals were presented by the Mayor Councillor H.J. Davy.

In 1937 King George V1 was crowned in Westminster Abbey. Saltash again celebrated this splendorous occasion, with processions, street decorations, eas, sports and bonfires etc. The Mayor, Councillor Webber and Mayoress played leading parts in

On 2 June 1953 Princess Elizabeth's Coronation took place at Westminster Abbey. Saltash Borough, under the leadership of Miss W.M. leadership of Miss W.M. Fearnside, MBE. J.P. Mayor, and the Corporation, organised a mammoth event

The Corporation included the Councillors uncillors and supported by Aldermen: Corporate Officials and a general Committee. There were dozens of organisations co-operating with the Committees, covering virtually every organisation in Saltash at that time

The outstanding events included torch light processions, bands, concerts, Flora Dance, and open air dancing at the Stadium. Moreover, a festival of arts, drama, elocution and craft, massed choirs, and physical education.

The Saltash Townswomen's Guild ran a literature Coronation Competition.

There was a Grand Carnival of floats and walking entries; those that entered were pedestrians, cycles, motor cycles, private cars, commercial vehicles and tableaux, all winning prizes from ten shillings, with the top prize of

There was a cricket match for ladies and gents, a punch and Judy show and a United Service at Kimberley Stadium.

There was programme of flat races, three legged races, wheelbarrow races. a special youth marathon, bun and lemonade races, and slow cycle races

I was there that sports day, and entered the girl's flat race for the over 9 and under 12 (100 yards) and came in first! I won a teaspoon with the town crest. I was so delighted!

There were side shows, including a unique balloon race and donkey rides for the children.

The three days of events concluded with a bonfire and grand firework display.

So proudly, I, with most of my family attended all the events in Saltash during Queen Elizabeth ll Coronation celebrations. Saltash as it does today do a magnificent job, and its success has gone down in our history books for us all to reflect upon 70



The Observer caught up with Hilary Frank, lead organiser of Saltash May Fair, to get her take on the weekend's events.

Observer: The sun came out and so did most of Saltash! You must have been thrilled.

Hilary: Overwhelmed. I don't think I've ever seen so many people at May Fair!

Observer: There were so many highlights, but what was your biggest headache?

Hilary: Probably finances. Everything is so expensive these days. By the time you've added up costs for things like road closures, medical cover and stage hire the expenditure climbs to more than £12,000. We cover about one third of that through funding from generous sponsors like Saltash Town Council. A little over one third is generated from pitch fees paid by stall holders, but we have to raise the rest through raffle tickets and funding bids. That's why we are so grateful

to people who bought raffle tickets. Every ticket really does help fund the fun! Observer: The Wellness Day in Longstone Park seemed to go well. Are you looking to repeat that next year?

Hilary: Hopefully, yes. The Tamar Trotters as a whole and Colin Bunting in particular were absolutely amazing in organising the Half Marathon and other races.
